The Sword Swallower By Paul Gurney

As I recall the old days, a small circus sometimes came to Warrensburg, but they generally appeared amateurish and were not very well received.

They could not compete with the big circuses that came to Glens Falls. Here was real show business that could bring a strong desire to join up and run away from home.

At one time an aunt took the boy to watch the "101 Wild West Ranch" detrain at a railroad siding in Glens Falls at about 4:30 one Adirondack summer morning.

Historian's Corner By Sandi Parisi

How would you like to be a guest at a New Year's Dinner that cost \$162,666.67?

In 1913 George F. Underwood entertained his relatives at a \$6,000 New Year's Eve dinner. It was at the Warren House at 1:00 in the afternoon. (This building sat approximately where Direct Deposit is, but it burned to the ground in April of 1921.) The landlord, Maurice O'Connor was instructed to spare no effort or expense in its preparation. [Unfortunately the menu was not included.]

There were 16 guests, from Horicon, Chestertown, Hudson Falls and Glens Falls, including six of his first cousins. During the dinner, the cousins were each presented with an envelope containing a registered bond bearing interest at 5 per cent. The only guest that was not a relative or related by marriage was the Honorable Louis W. Emerson, an intimate friend of Mr. Underwood.

Mr. Underwood was for many years a lumberman and was known throughout this area. Some years before the dinner, he was made superintendent of the woodlands for the International Paper Company and later became vice president of the company. He had

lived in Fort Edward, but his duties called him to New York City. He had a camp at Underwood (at I-87 at Exit 30), where he entertained lavishly during the season. He became very wealthy, but to his friends he was the same George Underwood he was in days of yore.

Information above was found in a 1913 article from the Warrensburgh News.

*The American Institute for our Cost of Living Calculator, also known as the COLA Calculator, calculates the cost of living in the past and in the future based on their research. Hence \$6,000 in 1913 is the equivalent of \$162,666.67 in 2017.

Speaking of Calculating prices, in 1915 there were 65 cars belonging to residents of Warrensburg.

In a 1915 article in the Warrensburgh News, it was estimated that the values of those cars ranged from \$500 to \$7,500. [In today's economy those figures would be \$12,200 to \$183,000.]

The discussion was held at Kid Manzer's Barber Shop in the Music Hall Building. The men sitting around figured that the average of the 65 cars would be about \$1,000 [current value \$26,840].

It was noted that in a country town of about 3,000 population,

that was a lot of cars and money. At that time there were two garages, one selling Ford, Overland and Reo cars, the other selling Maxwell and Saxon cars.

The cars that were in Warrensburg and the dates of their manufacture were: Reo (1905-1975), Stearns (1898-1929), Stanley Steamer (1902) -1924), Pierce Arrow (1901-1938), Stevens-Durvea (1901-1915), Maxwell (1904-1925), Metz (1909-1911), Saxon (1913-1923), Flanders (1910-1913), EMF, (also known jokingly as "Every Mechanics Friend") (1908-1921), Abbott (1909-1919) Sears Roebuck (1908-?) Cars that were here and currently still being produced are Cadillac, Ford, and Buick. Ford the most popular car in Warrensburg in 1915.

Finally, it seems that we are getting gas at a bargain these days. In 1915 it was 15 cents a gallon which would be \$3.66 a gallon today.


















The winners of our 2017 raffle of two Old Town kayaks were Joe and Pat Nelson of Thurman and Peekskill, members since 2006.

As the day dawned, an exhilarating entourage of elephants, camels, horses, cowboys, Indians and caged animals were shunted about and river to the site on West St.

Roust-a-bouts team 'worked the great confusion into an operable entity that opened as advertised on the splash of posters that had plastered the country-side for weeks.

The boys spent the afternoon in the side shows because the "Big Top" was best appreciated at night. He was completely taken-in by the performance of the sword swallower, who thrust glistening blades all the way down the esophagus and with a great flourish breathed real fire from his lips.

The act was topped off by firing a .22 rifle anchored to a spindle thrust in his throat. By gosh, these astounding achievements simply had to be explored at home!

A set of short, blunt nosed scissors and a short length of metal rod were greased with Vaseline. Oh! Back goes the head, the mouth and throat are aligned am behold, it wasn't so difficult, after all.

A flourishing bow from the waist as he stood in front of the mirror convinced the boy that he had a promising future, like Prof. Zimbo.

Next came a long shiny button hook. (Some shoes were styled with button fastenings in those days). The darned hook got caught on the boy's palate, he got scared and yanked it out, tearing a bit of soft palate.

A hurried but voiceless trip to Dr. Goodman's office stopped the bleeding. "Rashness attendeth youth."

The abject shame of being exposed to such an unexplainable predicament was hard enough to endure, but how did the news get to be so generally known to others?

The gang that gathered about the Music Hall block after supper each evening to socialize or to start a game of "run-sheep-run" was fully informed and the boy underwent a terrific "kidding."

He also decided to forego the possibil-

ity of becoming an exponent of the fine art of sword swallowing, as outlined in Prof. Zimbo's pamphlet of instructions that cost an extra 25 cents over and above the price of admission.

Joseph Anselmo

Born in Sicily in 1896, Joseph moved from NYC to Warrensburg in 1911 where he met and married Orpha Wilsey. Orpha's family had resided in Warrensburg from the middle of the 19th century. Joseph was employed by the Highway Department of Warren County for more than 40 years.

Emergency Squad and the American Legion Post 446. He was a 57-year member of the Warrensburg chapter 325, Royal Arch Masons. The Fire Company elected Joseph as Assistant Fire Chief in April of 1947. He was instrumental in helping with the War Memorial in the Warrensburg Cemetery and was a member of the Bear Waller Hunting Club. Joe died in 1982 at his home on Third Avenue where he was known for his abundant vegetable gardens.

Joseph A. Aiken

Born in 1889, son of Lester and Josephine (Wemsley) Aiken, Joe become a professional drummer and member of the Adirondack Pipes& Drums (still existing today). He served in World War * in Italy and France as an ambulance driver from 1918 to 1919 and

during that time kept a daily diary, which can be seen at the Warrensburgh Museum of Local History. Joe married Ruth Porter in 1924 (his second wife), they had a daughter Josephine and a son Lester. Les was a talented and popular athlete. He had been married but two weeks to Kitty Langworthy when he was killed in a automobile accident on his way to a summer job in Lake George in 1948. Joe Aiken died in 1968 at the age of 79.

Lee R, Orton

Born in 1894, the son of William Clark Orton and Ella Wheeler Orton, Lee worked for Berry Wood-ward in the undertaking business before partnering with Cassius McCloskey. They purchased their late employer's funeral home and renamed it Orton and McCloskey Funeral Home. Orton played for the Maplewood's baseball team in the early 20th century and had a brief career in professional base-ball. He served as Town Clerk from 1928 to 1944, when he was elected Town

Supervisor. He remained in that position until 1964. In 1958 he was

named Chairman of the Warren County Board of Supervisors, serving in that post through 1961. Married to Sara Kilday of Madison, Pennsylvania, they had a son William Clark and a daughter Saralee. Lee Orton died in

1966. Orton Drive, through the subdivision of the former Crooning Pines property, was named in his honor.

Geneva Kenyon

Miss Kenyon was a teacher in Warrensburg District No 3 school. historical records show that 6 certificates were issued for satisfactory completion of two terms of 4th, 5ht and 6th graders between 1906 and 1909. These certificates were signed by the school commissioner and teachers . F. Geneva Kenyon is listed as one of the teachers. Geneva was also a member of the Hackensack Rebeka Lodge 442

ganized on May 5 1910. Geneva was heavily involved in the Home Defense. Her sweetheart Harold Bowen was stationed in Germany during WW I
